For **Short-Term classes that have less than 5 meetings**, the last day to drop with a refund is the day **before** the first class meeting.

Last day to ADD a class: 20% of total days

Last day to DROP a class without a "W" (with a refund) = 10% of total days

Last day to DROP a class without a "W" (no refund) = 20% of total days

Last day to DROP a class with a "W" (no refund) = 75% of total days

2. The consequence(s) for a violation of this policy will be determined by the individual instructors. These consequences shall not exceed a maximum 48 hour suspension as provided for in the Education code (Section 76032).

Late Start and Short-term classes

Students can add open classes via the Portal until the day before the first class meeting. **The information in this schedule is accurate as of the printing date, November 01, 2016.**

For the most up-to-date course listings, go to: missioncollege.edu and click on **MC Portal** and log on. Or choose **Search for Courses** under the Top Destinations on the right-hand side of the home page.

All courses, course sections, and classes of the District shall be open for enrollment to any person who has been admitted to West Valley or Mission Colleges. Enrollment may be subject to any priority system that has been established. Enrollment may also be limited to students meeting properly validated prerequisites and corequisites, or due to other practical considerations such as exemptions set out in statute or regulation.

Last day to drop Late Start and Short-term classes for a refund and without a W

Refunds for short-term classes are given if students drop before 10% of the scheduled class meetings have elapsed. For short-term classes that meet five days or less, the last day to drop classes for a refund is the day **before** the first class meeting. Faculty signature not required to drop classes.

Admissions and Registration Information

MISSION COLLEGE GRANTS

ADMISSION TO ANYONE WHO IS...

- 1) a high school graduate.
- 2) eighteen (18) years of age or older.
- 3) a non-high school graduate, 16 or 17 years of age, who has in his/her possession at the time of registration one of the following:

- Certificate of the State Proficiency Test.
- G.E.D., California HS Equivalency Certificate.
- A formal, written document from the student's high school district indicating he or she is **exempted** from any high school attendance.
- a high school student in grades 11 or 12 whose admission as a part-time student is recommended by his or her high school principal.

To be considered California residents for tuition purposes, applicants who have eligible immigrant status or are out-of-state US citizens must reside in California for more than one year and one day prior to the first day of the term.

APPLY AND REGISTER

Apply on-line by following the link, **Apply Now**, on Mission's home page. After submitting your on-line application, you will immediately receive an email that will verify that your application has been submitted successfully. Within 48 hours, you will receive a second email that will provide you with your **college ID number and registration date**. If you skip a semester, you will need to re-apply to receive a new registration date. For inquiries about your on-line application contact askmc@missioncollege.edu

Register on or after your registration date via MC Portal/MyWeb Services at missioncollege.edu

Fees are due immediately after registration. If you are eligible for a fee waiver, visit the Financial Aid Office before registering for classes.

If you must submit a Prerequisite Challenge Form, a Student Petition form, or any other documentation before registration, go directly to the Admissions and Records Office for assistance at least one week prior to the start of the semester.

Please be prepared to pay any 'outstanding balance' if you register in-person or on-line.

Important: Normal communication with students is done via email. Please be sure to update your personal information, such as, e-mail addresses, phone numbers, etc, using MC Portal/MyWebServices, each term if necessary.

ASSEMBLY BILL 540

Any resident student, except a non-immigrant alien who meets all of the following requirements, shall be exempt from paying the nonresident tuition.

REQUIREMENTS:

- 1) The student must have attended a California high school for at least three full years,
- 2) The student must have graduated from a California high school or attained the equivalent prior to the start of the term (for example, passing the GED or CA proficiency exam).
- 3) An alien student who is without lawful immigration status must file an affidavit with the college stating that he or she has filed an application to legalize his or her immigration status, or will file an application as soon as he or she is eligible to do so.

This legislation does not apply to students who hold an F-1 Visa for International Students. Eligible non-resident students must file a **"California Nonresident Tuition Exemption Request"** form with the Admissions and Records Office. Non-resident students who are exempt from paying nonresident tuition under this legislation may be eligible for a Board of Governors Fee Waiver.

HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS REGISTRATION

Concurrently enrolled **special part-time high school students** in grades 11 and 12 must register In-Person starting three weeks before the first day of the term. Each term, high school students are required to submit an online Application for Admission. In addition, the student submits in person the High School Concurrent Enrollment form and the Parent/Guardian Medical Consent form. Registration in any college course must be approved by the high school principal, or designee. Photo identification is required for all transactions. HS Concurrent Enrollment and medical consent forms may be obtained on-line at missioncollege.edu (A&R page) or from the Admissions and Records Office.

Special Full-Time high school students registering in 11+ units are required to pay for all enrollment fees. Basic service fees are charged to high school, concurrent enrollment students.

AUDITING OF COURSES

The Governing Board of the West Valley-Mission Community College District, under the provisions of Chapter 5, Section 76370 of the Education Code, hereby authorizes individuals to audit regularly scheduled credit courses, subject to the following conditions and provisions:

1. The student must meet college eligibility requirements for admissions to audit courses.
2. The student must be an active student in our District.

3. The student must be in good academic standing.
4. The current fee legislated of \$15.00 per unit per semester shall be charged for each course audited. Students enrolled in courses to receive credit for 10 or more units shall not be charged a fee to audit three or fewer semester units per semester. Fees may be subject to legislative updates and revisions.
5. No student auditing a course shall be permitted to change his or her enrollment in that course to receive credit for the course.
6. Audit registration will only be processed after the last date to add as posted in the class schedules and will require permission of the Instructor-of-record, including his or her signature authorizing audit registration in the class.
7. All current and outstanding fees must be paid at the time of Audit Registration. Auditing fees are non-refundable after two weeks or 10% of class meetings of attendance.
8. The student must have previously enrolled for credit for the maximum number of times allowed for the particular course requested for auditing.
9. The course must be approved by the department-of-record as an auditable course.
10. If the course is a variable unit class, the student must enroll for the maximum number of units available.

You may obtain the 'Request to Audit' form at the Welcome Center or in the Admissions Office.

ADDING CLASSES

Students may add open classes on-line via MC Portal/MyWebServices until the day before the first class meeting. For short term/late-start classes, students will be able to add open sections until the day before the first class meeting.

WAIT LIST

If a class is closed, students can add their names to the section's wait list before the class begins. If 'registered students' drop classes, and space becomes available, **eligible** students on the wait list will be offered registration in the class. **Students will be notified by email of their status.** It is recommended that students monitor their wait list regularly to check on the current class status. Students with Holds, overlapping classes, etc. will remain on the wait list. If you change your mind about waitlisting for a particular course section, please drop yourself from that waitlist to allow other students to add.

ADDING A CLOSED CLASS... ADD CODES

To add a class once the it begins, you must attend the first class meeting (whether you are wait listed or not). If there are seats available, the instructor will assign students Add Codes to add the class. The Add Code is a four digit number that gives the student authorization to add the class via our on-line registration system—**MC Portal/MyWebServices**. (You will need one different Add Code for each class you wish to add.) The Add Codes are valid through the first two weeks of the semester or a shorter period if a short-term course.

DROPPING CLASSES

It is the student's responsibility to officially drop classes. Do not assume that you will be dropped by the instructor or by any process that drops students for non-payment. If classes are not dropped, the student will be responsible for payment of all enrollment fees related to the class (even if the student never attended the class). Check the Calendars in this schedule of classes for deadlines to drop classes. Classes may be dropped via **MC Portal/MyWebServices** at missioncollege.edu

The instructor's signature is not required to drop classes.

Multiple Withdrawals from the same course

Title 5; Chapter 6 Section 55024 Revision

Effective July 1, 2009, college policy has limited the number of times that a student may withdraw from the same course. A student may withdraw and receive a W symbol on his or her academic records a total of three (3) times for enrollment in the same course. After the third W, the registration system will block registration in the course. To register again for the same course, the student will have to submit a Student Petition form to the Admissions & Records Office.

REFUNDS

To be eligible for a refund of enrollment fees, students must drop classes by the published deadline.

Dropping a class after the published deadline will result in loss of enrollment fees. Adding classes after the refund deadline will require that new fees be paid. Refunds for ASB card and Parking Permits are processed when the request is made at the Admissions and Records Office by the **"last day to drop with a refund"** deadline. A parking permit refund requires the return of the parking permit. Refunds for Credit Card payments will be returned to the credit card. Check and cash payments will be refunded by one of three methods as chosen by the student: refund loaded to a student-assigned debit card; refund transferred via ACH to student's personal banking account; or check mailed to the student's current home address. It is important that we have a current address on file. The refund process takes from 4 to 6 weeks.

SHORT-TERM CLASSES

Enrollment fees for short-term classes will be refunded if students drop before 10% of the scheduled class meetings have elapsed. For short-term classes that meet for less than five days, students must drop the day before the first class meeting to receive a refund.

FEES

Mandatory registration fees are determined by the State and/or the College's Board of Trustees and must be paid by all students immediately after registration each term. Effective Summer 2012:

Enrollment Fee = \$ 46.00 per unit

Non Resident Tuition = \$205.00. per unit

The Enrollment Fee is subject to change as approved by the California State Legislature.

Health Fee = \$19.00 per semester

The mandatory health fee supports the Student Health Services. The health fee is not a replacement for personal health care insurance. The health fee is exempted for,

- 1) Students who depend exclusively upon prayer for healing in accordance with the teachings of a bona fide religious sect, denomination, or organization.
- 2) Students who are attending a community college under an approved apprenticeship training program (Ed Code 76355)

Any student who either requests an exemption of the health fee or is determined by a Student Services program to warrant review for exemption will be referred to the Financial Aid Director of the respective college. The FA Director and at least one FA supervisor or technician will review these requests on a case by case basis.

Student Center Fee

This fee supports the Student Center and is assessed at \$1 per unit up to a maximum of \$5 per semester.

Associated Student Government (ASG)

Membership/ID Card Fee. This \$7 membership fee charged at the time of registration supports a variety of student services, activities, programs, scholarships, and discounts and covers the initial cost of the ID card. Should a student choose not to be a member, the fee is refundable when requested by the "refund" deadline. ID cards and stickers are available in the Campus Center Lobby. To obtain your ID card, you will need a copy of your registration statement and picture ID.

ASG Representation Fee

This \$1.00 fee per semester, effective Fall 2011, is collected for the purpose of establishing a student representation fee. The proceeds support student government representatives stating their positions and viewpoints before city, county, and district government as well as offices and agencies of the state government. Should a student choose not to be represented, the fee is refundable when requested by the "refund" deadline.

Convenience Fee

A one-time per semester non-refundable fee of \$3 is assessed for the use of MC Portal/MyWebServices, and in-person credit card payment.

Parking Permit Fee

NOTIFICATION OF TAX IDENTIFICATION NUMBERS (TIN) OR SOCIAL SECURITY NUMBERS (SSN) REQUIRED COLLECTION & USAGE

Federal legislation relating to the Hope Tax Credit and Internal Revenue Service (IRS) 1098T production mandates that all colleges report student SSN or TIN numbers to the IRS. This IRS mandate requires colleges to collect the SSN or TIN. A student may refuse to disclose his or her SSN or TIN to the IRS but the IRS is then authorized to fine the student in the amount of \$50.

Mission College does not use the SSN or TIN as student identifier- we assign a unique student ID to every student.

All SSNs and TINs collected as mandated are protected by federal regulations under the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA).

Financial Aid Information

MAINTAINING PERSPECTIVE

The purpose of financial aid is to assist students in their pursuit of education and career goals by removing some of the day-to-day financial pressures that may interfere. Federal and state financial aid is intended to supplement, not replace, a student's resources. In other words, students are expected to contribute, to the extent they are able, toward their educational costs. Mission College offers a variety of federal, state and institutional aid programs to assist students in meeting the costs of their education. To obtain information on eligibility requirements and necessary application forms, students are encouraged to visit the MC Portal to review your file status, stop by the Financial Aid Office or visit our website.

Some awards are subject to availability of funds; therefore, it is highly recommended that you apply as early as possible.

BOARD OF GOVERNOR'S FEE WAIVERS (BOGFW)

Board of Governors Waiver (BOGFW) covers the enrollment fees, a portion of the parking fee, and, for lower income students, BOGWA, may also cover the campus center fee.

Recipient must be a California resident for at least one year and one day prior to the first day of each semester. AB540 Students (undocumented residents) now qualify for the BOGFW! Applications are available on our website or at the Financial Aid Office.

BOGWA: To be eligible, you (or one of your parents, if you are dependent) must be a current recipient of public assistance such as AFDC/TANF/CalWORKS, SSI, GA, or others.

BOGWB: To be eligible, you (or one of your parents, if you are a dependent) must meet the following income standards:

BOGW C: To be eligible, you must qualify for a Pell Grant and/or have a minimum of \$1,104.00 of "unmet need" as determined after completing a Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) online.

Parking Information

WINTER SESSION

There is no grace-period during the Winter Session. All vehicles parked on campus during the Winter Session must have a valid parking permit properly displayed at all times.

During the Winter Session, (Monday January 4, through Thursday January 28, 2016) all of the following parking permits will be valid for use:

- Fall 2015 Semester Permit
- Spring 2016 Semester Permit
- Daily Parking Permit

Students who have already purchased a Fall 2015 or Spring 2016 semester length permit may use either of these permits to legally park on campus during the Winter Session. In addition, any student who is officially enrolled in a Winter Session class, and who does not already own a Fall 2015 or Spring 2016 semester length permit is eligible to receive a FREE student parking permit valid for use during the 2016 Winter Session. Winter Session students may pick-up their free student parking permit at the Admissions and Records office during normal business hours.

SPRING SEMESTER

A student parking "Grace-Period" will be observed during the week immediately prior to the start of the Spring semester and during the first week of the Spring semester. (Monday January 25 through Sunday February 7, 2016). During the grace period, no parking citation will be issued to any vehicle that is parked in a marked student parking stall without a permit; all other parking violations will be enforced. Parking citations will be issued to vehicles failing to display a valid student parking permit beginning Monday February 8, 2016..

GENERAL INFORMATION

A semester-length student parking permit may be purchased online at missioncollege.edu or in person at the Admissions and Records Office. For online purchases, a printable temporary permit will also be provided if the permit purchased is currently in use. To purchase a permit, either online or

in person, you will need to know your vehicles make, model, color and license plate number. To be valid, the permit must be properly placed on the vehicle and be clearly visible from the outside. To be properly placed, it must be affixed to the inside of the front windshield, bottom corner, driver's side. Improper or non-display of a permit will result in a parking citation.

- One-day "Daily" parking permits may be purchased at any of the daily permit dispensers located in parking lots B, C and D. Daily permits are \$3.00 per day and all daily permit dispensers will accept \$1.00 bills, \$1.00 coins, quarters, dimes and nickels. Daily permits must be displayed on the front dashboard and the expiration date must be visible from the outside of the vehicle.
- Visitors who will be on campus for a brief visit may take advantage of a limited number of free forty (40) minute time zone parking stalls located in the front row of Parking Lot A. Vehicles properly parked in a marked time zone stall do not need to display a parking permit. Visitors who believe their visit may exceed the posted time limit are encouraged to purchase a daily parking permit for use in a student parking stall. Vehicles parked in a marked time-zone in excess of the posted time limit may receive a citation.
- Motorcycles/motorscooters are prohibited from parking in spaces designated for four-wheel vehicles. Designated motorcycle parking is available in each parking lot. No parking permit is required for motorcycles parking in designated motorcycle parking areas.
- Disabled parking—all drivers who are disabled (as defined in the California Vehicle Code Section 295.5) and use a designated disabled parking stall must display a valid placard or specialized license plates issued by the California Department of Motor Vehicles. Failure to display a valid placard or plate will result in a citation and fine of \$285.
- Special parking and loading—Students or Staff members who have special parking or loading needs must contact the District Police in advance. Business cards or notes left on the vehicle are not acceptable and a citation will result. No warnings are issued.

- This parking information was accurate at the time of publication. However, due to changes in legislation, procedure, or policy, these regulations or procedures are subject to change without written notice. This is a summary of District Parking Policies. - There is no grace period for timed zones, red zones, handicap zones, staff parking and other restricted areas. Parking areas specifically marked for disabled parking, red zones, loading zones, time zones and other restricted areas are enforced every day of the year, 24-hours a day.
- Student parking permits are required in all student areas seven days a week, Monday through Sunday, between 7:00am and 10:00pm. Overnight parking is prohibited without prior authorization from the District Police Department. Vehicles left overnight without authorization from the District Police may be towed at owner's expense.
- Stolen permits should be immediately reported to the District Police Department by calling 408-855-5435 or by visiting the Police business office located at the campus center. Lost permits will not be replaced free of charge, however, a replacement permit may be purchased at the original purchase price. BOG (Board of Governor) students who wish to purchase a replacement permit at the discounted rate must report the loss of their first permit to the District Police Department to be eligible for a replacement permit at the discounted price.

Final examinations will not be given in advance of scheduled times.

A final examination is required of all students in all classes. Semester-length courses are required to have a final during the scheduled exam period. Courses that are less than regular semester length will have their final on the last day/night the class is scheduled. Students taking classes online, or courses taught off-campus should see their instructor or course syllabus to determine final exam times. Classes meet once during the final exam period.

All finals will be two (2) hours in length. The following are guidelines which will determine your final exam schedule for full semester-length courses.

- Classes that meet only one day each week:
- If your class meets only one day each week and starts before 6:30 pm, the final exam will be held for 2 hours in the same room, starting at the regular class time.
- If your class meets only one day each week and starts at 6:30 pm or later, the final exam will be held in the same room, from 7:30 pm to 9:30 pm.

- Classes that meet two or more times each week, the class will be held for 2 hours starting at the regular class starting time on one of its regular meeting days as identified from the following table:
- The final exam will be on the **first** class meeting of final exams week at its usual time if the class starts in the ranges of:
 - 7:45 am – 9:15 am
 - 10:55 am – 12:25 pm
 - 2:05 pm – 3:35 pm
 - 5:15 pm – 6:45 pm
- The final exam will be on the **second** class meeting of final exams week at its usual time if the class starts in the ranges of:

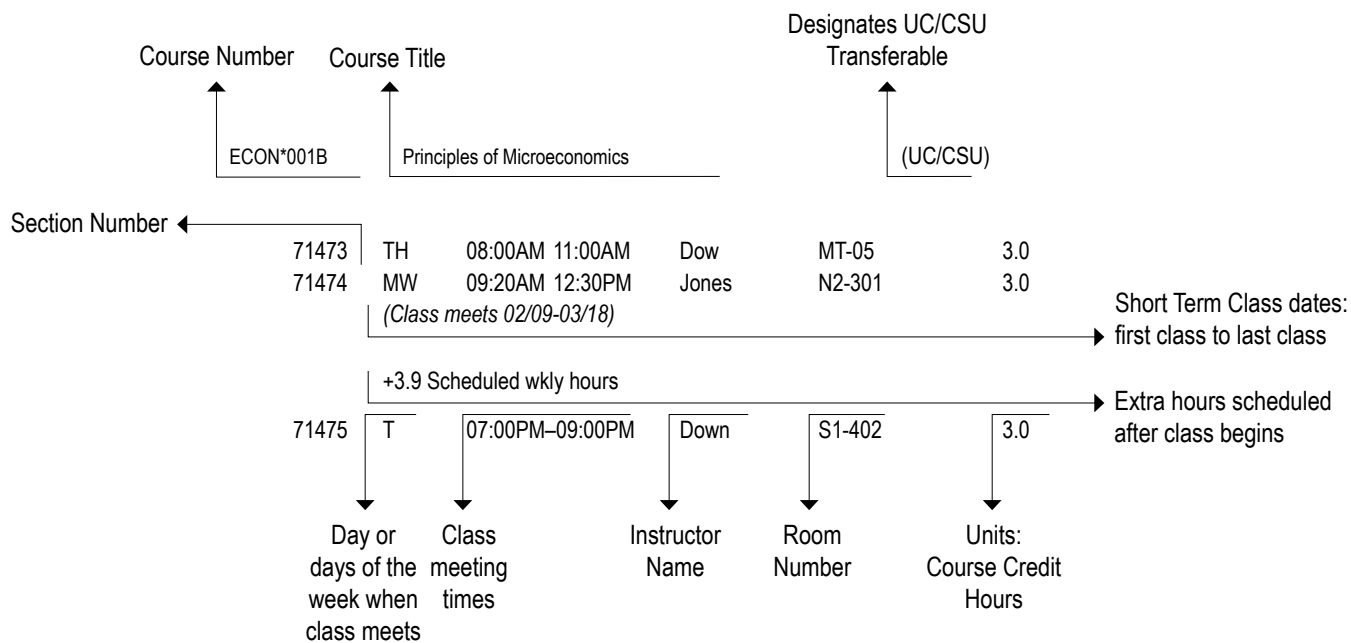
Course Repetition and Families of Courses

New State regulations severely limit the ability of courses to be repeated after receiving a passing grade. In addition, there are groupings of courses in the West Valley-Mission Community College District with similar active participatory content called "families" within the Kinesiology, Wellness & Human Performance, Physical Education, Art, Theatre, and Music disciplines. West Valley and Mission Colleges' courses in these defined families are linked, independent of location taken, and students may only attempt up to 4 courses in any single family. An attempt is defined as receiving any grade or notation (e.g., W for withdrawal) in any previous or current terms – this is a cumulative count of attempts. If a family has less than 4 courses in its offerings and you have received passing grades for each of its courses, the maximum attempts allowed may be less than 4.

Students with documented, extenuating circumstances must complete and submit a Student Petition to the Admissions & Records Office for consideration of attempts beyond 4 within an individual family.

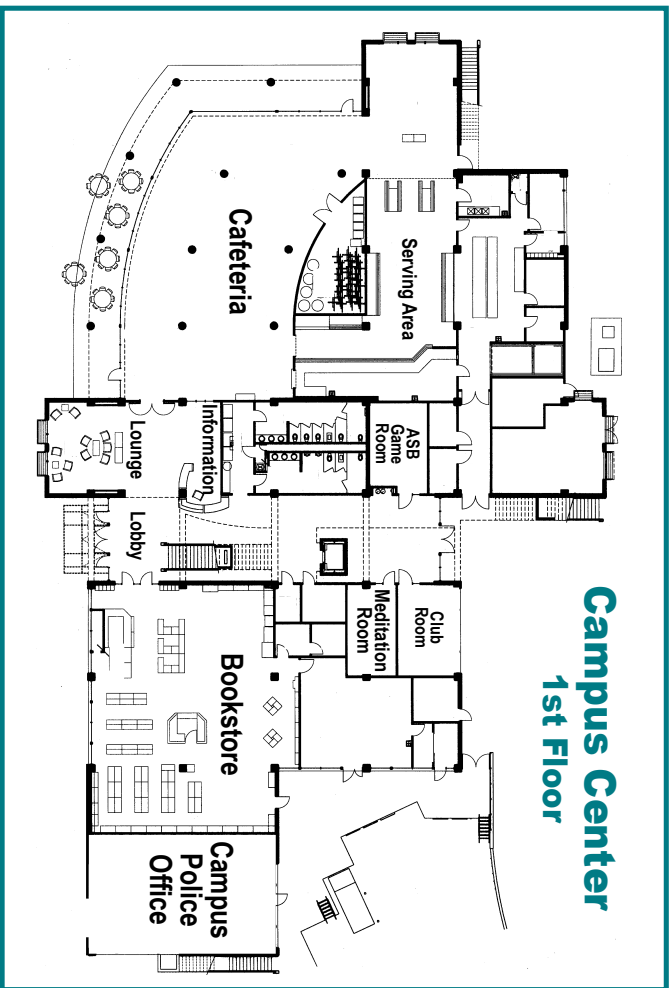
Main Building—1st Floor



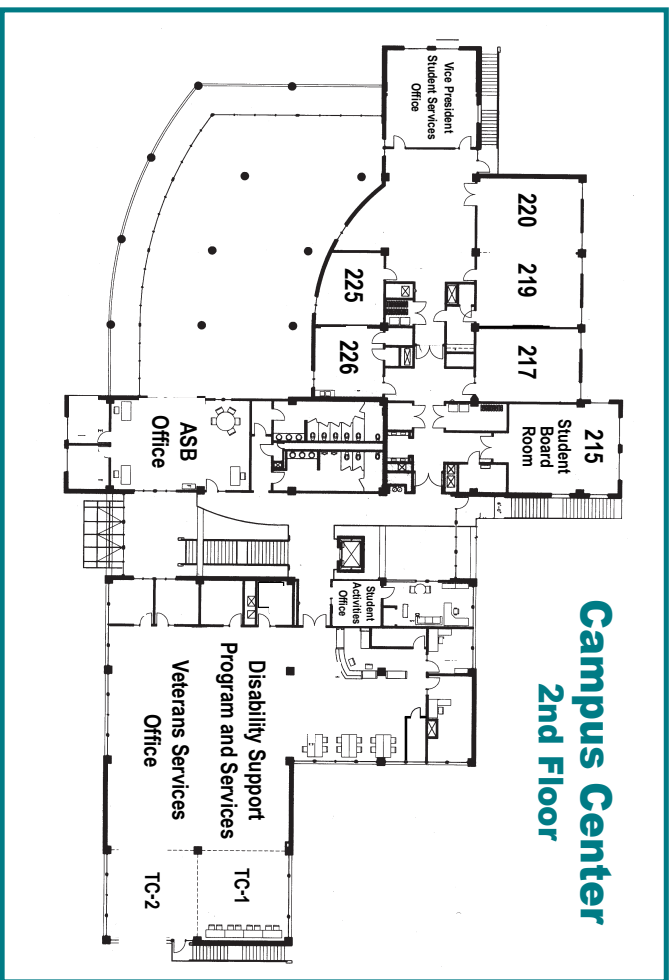

PRIORITY REGISTRATION: How to get it. How to keep it.

WHAT & WHY?

Changes to priority registration throughout the California Community Colleges system will help you get the courses you need to meet your educational goals. Priority registration will be given to students who work with a counselor or advisor to develop an education plan, succeed in their classes and stay on track. Mission College staff will be providing services to help. Yes, it really is that easy.

WHEN

You will need to pay attention to what you are doing now so you can enjoy the benefits of priority registration in the future.

WHAT DO I NEED TO DO?

Continuing students

- Check-in with a counselor or advisor to develop or update your education plan.
- Maintain good academic standing with at least a 2.0 GPA. If you don't, you will lose your priority enrollment.
- Don't enroll in more courses than you think you can finish. You must complete at least 50% of your enrolled units each semester or quarter.
- Don't accumulate more than 100 units by fall 2014, excluding most remedial and ESL courses. If you are nearing 100 units you should meet with a counselor as soon as possible to plan your remaining courses to meet your goals.
- Some high-unit majors or programs may be exempt from the 100-unit cap. Always check with your counseling office to be sure.

New Students

- Complete college orientation.
- Complete the assessment process.
- Meet with a counselor or advisor to develop an education plan.
- Once you begin your higher education journey, maintain good academic standing.

WAIT! I'M ON ACADEMIC PROBATION... NOW WHAT?

If you're on academic or progress probation you should meet with a counselor or advisor as soon as possible to develop a game plan to get back on track to meeting your academic or career goals. An appeal process is available if you lose priority. You should check with the Mission College Admissions Office for more information.

SOME SPECIAL CONSIDERATIONS

Former and current foster youth, active duty military and recent veterans will continue to receive the highest priority registration as provided by California law as long as you meet the outlined requirements.

Students in Extended Opportunity Programs and Services and Disabled Students Programs and Services who have completed orientation and assessment and have an education plan in place will also receive high priority.

YOUR REWARD

With this new priority registration system, students who are making progress toward their goals will be rewarded for their efforts. If you stay focused on your goals you should be able to get the classes you need to succeed. If you need help understanding and meeting the new requirements at Mission College, make an appointment with a counselor or advisor today.
